AHS SLEEPOVER TO RHS CHATSWORTH. 5th TO 7th JUNE 2019

On a bright Wednesday morning a group of 40 members left Abingdon for a short break to visit the flower show at Chatsworth House organised by the RHS. The weather forecast for the break was not good but so far we were lucky.

Our first visit was to Barnsdale Gardens, the garden from which Geoff Hamilton presented Gardeners World from 1979 until his untimely death in 1996. The garden is now run by his son, Nick Hamilton who was present in the garden, at one time unloading a lorry! The gardens which were featured in the Gardeners World programme are still there, which brought back many memories from the past, and everything was lovingly maintained. I was in awe at the hostas, hardly a nibble on any of them. The tea room was well used for lunch and tea before we started our journey towards Sheffield for our overnight stay.

We were based at the Copthorne Hotel on Bramall Lane, next door to Sheffield United football ground. This is a new hotel of a high standard and everyone was delighted with their rooms. We felt honoured by the presence of Arit Anderson, Carol Klein, Adam Frost and their film crew in the restaurant having dinner at the same time as us, following a day's filming at the Chatsworth Show.

On Thursday morning, after a hearty breakfast, we travelled through the delightful scenic Derbyshire countryside to Chatsworth House for the show. This is the third year of the show and it has grown considerably during this time, but is still friendly with the exhibitors ready to offer advice. My favourite part was the long border competition, with ideas that we could easily transfer to our own gardens. The show gardens also gave us more inspiration, but perhaps on a bigger scale than many of us could manage. The floral marquee was a favourite with the members, our very pretty coach on the way back being proof of that, and the film crew were still filming during the day, more opportunities to spot the stars. There were talks going on throughout the day which made a welcome time to rest. Being in the grounds of Chatsworth House this was an ideal setting for a lovely day out. Some of the members also visited the house and gardens to complete their day.

On Friday morning it was time to say goodbye to the Copthorne Hotel and head south, passing through Chesterfield with its crooked spire and on to the National Memorial Arboretum. By the time we reached the Arboretum our luck had changed and it was raining and remained very wet for the rest of the day. There is a Service of Remembrance held in the chapel every day at 11.00am and we were just in time to take part in this. A new Visitor Centre was opened two years ago and is a very impressive building holding a good restaurant, gift shop and exhibition areas. They have a land train which is undercover and gives a commentary on the memorials as it makes its journey round the Arboretum, a very welcome respite from the rain for us. Buggy tours to the outlying parts of the Arboretum are also available; overall it covers 150 acres, with memorials for many organisations, not only military, such as the Fire Fighters, Police, Boys Brigade and SANDS. I have visited the Arboretum in the past and more memorials are being added all the time. It is a very pleasant and restful place to visit, and I find it very moving. With the rain still continuing we leave the Arboretum and make our way back towards Abingdon. Being Friday afternoon we were expecting hold ups but we made good time and everybody was dropped off safely by 6.30.
