Accounts for this year show a good balance of £12423.27 in total.

Our bank account stands @£5383.09 and the National Savings @£5616.18. The bank account includes the deposits for the postponed holiday, £1817.25, and we hope to be able to use this in 2021. Also included in this account is the balance of the Muriel Welch Legacy of £831.82.

We withdrew £1000 from the National Savings in January to boost our bank account but did not need to use it this year.

We have maintained our affiliation with the Royal Horticultural Society and the National Vegetable Society.

Our plant sale was a success, despite the road closure, raising £179.94.

The 2020 accounts have now been approved by our external Examiner.

### Recipe Linda Berry

Marzipan Apples
Ingredients
4 large cooking apples
Juice of 1 lemon
2oz/50g melted butter
4oz/100g marzipan
1 dessertspoon of brandy
12 blanched almonds roughly chopped or use flaked almonds
Optional 150 ml of apple juice

Cream or custard to serve Oven 200 C/400 F/ Gas Mark 6

#### Method

Peel the apples and cut out the cores

Brush first with lemon juice, then with melted butter – inside and out.

Arrange in a buttered, ovenproof dish

Knead the marzipan with the brandy until pliable.

Stuff the marzipan down the centre of the apples and place any surplus on top.

Sprinkle with the almonds

Add the apple juice to the dish, if using

Bake for 25 minutes or until the apple is cooked and the marzipan is golden.

# Healthy soil and biological symbiosis Bryan Hitchman

Having a garden or allotment is mainly fun!, despite the pesky pests and inclement weather with the cadence of the seasons upset by mankind footprint, leading to environmental changes.

Everything we grow and cherish needs a firm foundation, particular soil, where their roots need to produce the vibrancy of its bounty. When we look at the biosphere of earth, the growing medium of productive soil is made up of these main types:- clay, sandy, silt, loam and chalky. Each presenting it problems for maintain health plants.

There are also two other important elements, water and sunshine, which all help in keeping the vibrance of the soil to propagate healthy plants. In addition, a subject that has fascinated me for many years since I was involved in the production of Homeopathic and Bach Remedies, is energy transference.

The earth is bathed in energy every day in the form of Electromagnetic radiation (EMR), an essential source that is used by plant leaves and soil underground. There is not enough space to explain the complex relationship, such as the energy flow between the soil and the plant. We already know that, if we take sweet corn as an example, picked and cooked in under an hour, it tastes so much better than shop bought ones. This is because the energy and vibrancy dissipates when it is pulled from the soil.

On My Christmas list last year was a book by **Nigel Palmer The Regenerative Growers guide to Garden Amendments**. This will give you all the knowhow and technical detail in improving your soil. It is in two main parts, **Nourishment from the Ground up and Making Mineral and Biological Amendments**.

The first part deals with the old plant model that, as gardeners we have been following for decades. A one way system of nutrient from the soil into the plant, with no biological importance involved. We use only fertilizers and sprays to kill pests. The new model in this book lays out a road map which give us an understanding of the model of symbiosis – the biological interaction, recognizing that plants can be grown without the need of artificial fertilizers or pesticides.

By using local materials such as nettles and even the weeds!, this simple process, on nurturing the soil ecosystem diversity and moving the mineral proportions of the soil balance by using crushed rocks etc., will facilitate a better energy flow from soil to plant. Built around these three strategies:-

- 1. Build healthy Soil
- 2. Correcting deficiencies and excesses of mineral nutrients.
- 3. Supplying the short term needs of the plant.

Section 2 of the book is like a gardener's cook book. A lot of us, I expect will have used comfrey extracts etc. but this book provides 70 pages of extraction amendments and methods. Some examples:-Organic brown sugar and plant waste used for encouraging plant growth and Fermented Fish used as foliage spray.

There are also many other useful mineral reference tables showing what you will get out of these amendments and a useful guide to what we can expect if we use single plants such as Dandelions which has one of the highest concentration of (CL) chlorine. Who knew that? The book goes into a lot of detail and gives you a great stepping stone to other books. I can not wait to get the allotment home brew on. The proof as they say is in the eating.
