Winter Flowers.....a view. (See our talk on 18 October).

Wallflowers have always been popular as they provide agreeable colour (and smell), but are untidy and best in large swathes of planting, There are dozens of varieties, and some are much better than others. You often don't know which variety you are getting unless you select the seeds and plant them in July/August for the following Spring.

Bulbs and corms can be expensive to buy, but many are perennial and will return in subsequent years, providing you remember where they are, and don't damage them with later plantings. There are varieties of narcissus that flower very early, so are worth considering. Cyclamen are easy and will spread given time. Anemone blanda look good in early Spring. Winter aconites also look bright, but are invasive and spread quickly.

Snowdrops are usually purchased 'in the green' i.e. when the foliage has grown and the flowers finished. They flower around February, but take several years to get established in the right conditions. Primroses (Primula and Polyantha) are nice but later to flower. Croci are good, but nice coloured ones often revert to the usual blue/purple after a few years.

Viola (Pansies) are popular for bedding. Planting times are important as are the correct varieties. I have never been successful with Winter flowering pansies grown from seed, but good plants are available. Most are not genuinely Winter flowering even though they are called that. You don't see many flowers in January.

There are a few plants that provide colour in the Winter. Hellebores have become very popular and are now available in pastel shades and black. They look somewhat ragged in appearance, so not everybody's choice. But they also look rather luxuriant. Again, best grown in groups and take several years to get established. Nerines flower late, nice colours but will probably be over by December. I also have some hardy Fuchsias that look good in November, but they will be gone after early frosts.

Reliable small shrubby plants are the Heathers and Callunas. I have one white one that flowers in the Winter. Get the right one for Winter, few are suitable for alkaline soils. Good for acidic soils like the new Forest area. The other possibilities include a number of flowering shrubs that keep their berries through Winter. Popular shrubs include Daphne vars. and Viburnum.
