On the 25th May we had our outing to Savill Gardens in Windsor Great Park. Forty-two members joined in and we had a great day out. The weather was good to us and was ideal for walking around the gardens. Not having been before I was surprised how nice it was with level paths to walk on and plenty of plants, shrubs and trees to see. The main show were the Azaleas and Rhododendrons both were at their prime in full flower and there were plenty to see. Some energetic members walked down to the Valley Gardens around a mile away to see even more. I understand it was well worth the walk even those that didn't make the distance said there was a lake which was well worth a visit. Unfortunately some of our members succumbed to the plants in the garden centre and came away with pots and trays of plants. We left at 4pm with no one left behind!





Our next outing is on 24th August to Bourton House Gardens and Chastleton House the application forms will be out towards the end of June and they must be back to me before the end of July to give me chance to organise everything.

Bourton House Gardens are situated on Bourton Hill just outside Morton in the Marsh. It is a small garden of just 3 acres with a tearoom and toilets. The garden features terraces, herbaceous borders and a topiary walk. As the gardens are small there will be a visit to nearby Chastleton House and gardens in the afternoon. This property is run by the National Trust. The house was built in the 17th century and has not been altered since. The NT wish to keep it unmodernised so there are no tea rooms on site but there are Toilets! Apparently, the church next door usually make teas etc on open days. I suggest you stock up at home or Bourton House. The Chastleton gardens are a series of rooms with a kitchen garden and wilderness walk. The admission price also includes Chastleton House. Friday 16th June 9 am departure for Trentham Garden which was beautiful with its Italian Garden, Lake, Woods and Park. There was also a lovely Garden Centre outside and an avenue of little shops. Entry is £1 per class.

Crafters are invited to enter the Handicraft class - Crafty Meal on a Plate. (Full details in the schedule) This will be judged by visitors to the show. The winner will be awarded the Muriel Welch Memorial Cup.
