4. Secretary's Report - Evelyn Walker

I would like to thank the previous secretary, Linda Berry, for her very professional and comprehensive set of instructions that she left us. I have some big shoes to step into. I'm not a horticulturalist so how 2025 went as far as growing things went I'm not sure but I do know it becomes more and more difficult to predict the weather patterns and when to plant. But as to entertainment, we have had some splendid talks this year, 6 in total, on a varied range of subjects. The suggestion of how to do pots and containers was more in my personal range of growing. The shows have both been very successful events, but will continue to evolve with new suggestions on how to compete for the cups and medals. The holiday was a really nice break, with some lovely weather just right for wandering through the gardens and sitting in the sunshine with a nice lunch. The entertainment in the hotel in the evenings was hilarious at times, and apart from one unfortunate incident resulting in a hospital visit, it went off very well. The Christmas lunch was once again well attended and it was a nice way to start the festive season. So on to 2026 and hopefully it will be a good growing year with lots of opportunities to sit and admire your handiwork.

## 5. Treasurer's Report - Karen Fisher

Our books were checked in January this year by Douglas Bradshaw, a retired employee of HMRC. He found that our accounts were adequate and satisfactory.

Our Lloyds current account as of 31<sup>st</sup> December 2025 is £5801.90.  
Our Newbury Building Society savings are £11063.60. We received £233.07 interest on this account at the end of October. There has been a change to the interest rate on 03/09/2025 to 2.1% (previously 2.3%).

Our 1<sup>st</sup> year of bank charges has amounted to £87.66. This is a monthly charge plus any money we pay into the account. We have had a 50% discount this year on charges which has now ended. As of 1<sup>st</sup> January 2025 our charges will be:-

Service charge monthly £4.25

Cash in/out at bank 42p per £100 at deposit machine, 75p at counter. BACS item 7p.

Cheques 42p at deposit point, 50p at counter

We have an adequate amount in the current account going into 2026, and a healthy reserve in the building society

## 6. Membership Secretary's Report - Karen Fisher

## 7. Show Secretary's Report - Barbara Bingley

2025 was another year with 2 successful shows.

Last year was the first year when entries were free and when no prize money was won. As an exhibitor myself, I missed the envelope containing my winnings, but as Show Secretary it meant a large saving in administrative time before & during the show. The change caused no detrimental effect on the number of entrants & entries.

This year we are going to trial starting the prize giving & raffle at 3:30 pm (15.30) instead of 4 pm (16.00). The shows will be open to the public & members for 1.5 hours before prize giving instead of 2 hours. This should still give visitors enough time to have a good look round, buy their raffle tickets, buy from the sales tables & enjoy a chat with a cup of tea.

I hope that you have already viewed this year's Spring show schedule and planned your entries. Seville oranges are still available in Waitrose and perhaps in next week's Monday market. There are handicraft classes to suit all our talents. Most of us could take a photograph of Winter & Spring. I would love to see increased numbers of members entering our shows.

The Autumn Show schedule is also on our website. I was amazed that members were able to defy the hot dry summer of 2025 to stage a show at all, let alone a full & colourful one! This year, due to several years with very low entries, there are no Summer garden classes. BUT you will all be able to send in photographs of your garden successes to our website, where all of us may view the pictures in the gallery.

I hope that members will enter both shows and for the first time the Muriel Welch Challenge Cup will be awarded to the member who enters at least 4 different sections in the Spring and/or Autumn Shows and gains most points, obtaining these in at least 2 sections. The winner will not be eligible to win in the subsequent 2 years.

Without the support of members, my fellow committee members & members who help on shows days it would not be possible to organise & put on the shows. Thank you all. And if there is a member who feels they have the time & the interest to become involved with the show aspect of the Society, please let me know!

## 8. Outings Report - Robin Carter

As many of you know we had two outings this year. The first was to Exbury Gardens in early May. The Gardens were beautiful with the azaleas and rhododendrons in full flower.
